Preliminary Results for January 2021

The Vancouver Island Drug Checking Project delivers drug checking services in Victoria, BC. Our service has been operating in partnership with SOLID Outreach, AVI Health and Community Services, Lantern Services, Dr. Chris Gill and the team at Vancouver Island University and Island Health Authority. This free and confidential service provides information on composition of substances and harm reduction information.

Highlighted findings:

- Novel finding of the synthetic opioid isotonitazene in an expected oxycodone sample
- Carfentanil found in 8 samples, half of which were expected opioid-down samples
- 43% of fentanyl-containing substances found to have concentrations greater than 10% fentanyl



- Benzodiazepines and/or etizolam found in 50% of expected opioid-down samples
- The maximum concentration of etizolam found was 15% in an expected Xanax sample

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

Preliminary Results for January 2021

What did we find?

We tested each sample to determine what active ingredients, adulterants, and cutting agents were present. The majority of samples did contain an active that fit into each expected category. However, we also detected a number of other notable components that may cause unexpected effects or impact the effectiveness of naloxone.



Quantification

Using paper spray mass spectrometry data included by our collaborators at Vancouver Island University we were able to quantify low level actives. These values are aggregate, inclusive to all expected drug categories in which they are found.
